


FOCAL POINT

HDR (High Dynamic Range) Imaging - "The Natural Look"

Hazel Meredith, APSA, HonNEC

Hazel Meredith is an award-winning photographer, teacher, speaker, workshop leader and a highly respected competition judge. In 2007, she began teaching post-processing techniques through local adult education programs, and now teaches at camera clubs and conferences across the U.S. as well as through her own workshops. She also offers her own webinars on various creative post-processing techniques, and has done webinars for Topaz Labs.

She released her first eBook, “Working with Textures & Overlays: Turn Ho-Hum into a Work of Art” in 2015, and the sequel in April 2019. Hazel loves the creative aspect of photography and post-processing, especially the use of textures, overlays and software to create unique images. She enjoys teaching and sharing her techniques to assist other photographers in realizing their own creative visions. In 2017 she and her husband, Dave, founded the “Creative Photography Conference” in New England. The event has begun moving around the country, expanding from its first years in MA.

Hazel is actively involved with the photographic community, and has held leadership roles and received honorary distinctions from several organizations. In the Fall of 2020 she was the recipient of the *Ashbrook Award for Digital Imaging Instruction* from the Photographic Society of America. She believes that camera clubs are a great way to share the passion of photography and keep learning and sharing new techniques.

HDR (High Dynamic Range) Imaging – “The Natural Look”

High Dynamic Range – what does that mean? Our eyes can see much more light in a scene than our cameras can capture. The purpose of HDR is to capture the extremes of light that your camera cannot capture in one image (for example, when there are very bright highlights and/or deep shadows where you wish to retain detail). Typical definitions consider it a process of capturing a high dynamic range of light and rendering it in a single image, which consists of putting it through a program that can “tone map” the image – I will be demonstrating with Photomatix, Nik & Aurora.

People often think of HDR images as the highly processed “grunge” look. This seminar will show how to utilize HDR for creating a “natural” look in your final image (even on flowers) while accenting texture and details.

Hazel Meredith, APSA, HonNEC, has been teaching photographers how to perfect their images and be creative since 2007. She has taught for several adult education programs; at many national and regional photographic conferences; and at camera clubs throughout Connecticut, Massachusetts, New York and beyond. She also offers her own workshops through Meredith Images. She has been an active member and officer for many camera clubs and organizations, and was awarded her APSA from the Photographic Society of America in 2013, and in 2018 received her HonNEC (Honorary Member of the New England Camera Club Council). In 2020 she was presented with the PSA Ashbrook Award for Digital Imaging Instruction. In 2017 she and her husband, Dave, founded the Creative Photography Conference, which is now Virtual. She has written 2 eBooks on "Working with Textures & Overlays: Turn Ho-Hum into a Work of Art". The eBooks as well as her own line of textures are available in her Peacock Studio online store at MeredithImages.com.

Image selections to the PSA & NECCC Interclub Competitions are made by the representatives to each organization. Individual entries can also be made to PSA competitions if you are a member. Our PSA representative is Todd Mathieson; our NECCC representative is Robyn Saur.

NECCC has moved to have individual print competitions rather than interclub print competitions at this time. The NECCC Individual Print Competition will be hosted at the Greater Lynn Photographic Association (GLPA). The categories are B&W (mono) and Color. FYI: PSA Guidelines for Borders: Not recommended for Nature but if any border is added to a Nature, Travel or PJ image it must be a small border of a neutral color (gray tones). There are no border restrictions in the PID Color or Monochrome Division.



Tips and Tricks - April's Theme: Photographing the Sky

Tips for Photographing the Sky

LOOK! Up in the sky! It's a BIRD! It's a PLANE! It's SUPERMAN! Well... in reality, when someone tells you to look up in the sky, you're probably not going to spot Superman, though you may well see a flock of birds returning from their winter migration, dramatic skies, a beautiful sunrise or sunset, the moon, stars, constellations, or if you are really lucky, maybe even the upcoming eclipse. Skies form the backdrop of some of the most important snapshots of our lives, and they may make, break, or define an image. If you're out photographing the stunning colors of a beautiful sunset or the danger and drama of an incoming storm, planning ahead and fine tuning your camera settings can result in some very compelling images. We have put together some helpful tips to consider for when you are out photographing the sky, when the sky frames your subject, or so you can be ready just in case Superman suddenly does fly in to save the day. If you are planning to photograph the eclipse, please refer back to our comprehensive article in the March Newsletter so you are prepared. Wishing everyone a spring season full of new beginnings, joy, and adventure.

Planning Ahead

- Apps such as Photographer's Ephemeris, Skygazer 4.5, Stellarium, and PhotoPills will help you plan your sky photography in terms of lighting conditions and considering tidbits such as when and where celestial bodies may be viewed.
- June to September are the best months to photograph the Milky Way in our hemisphere. It is vertical until August.
- If you want to capture the moon, check for the phase of the moon and the direction of the moonrise.
- If you want to capture the stars, they are best seen 4 days before and 4 days after the new moon.
- If you want to capture the full moon, dusk is the best time.
- If you want to capture dramatic daytime skies, pay attention to the weather. Approaching storms and departing storms may present some interesting scenes.
- Best times for sky photography: Sunrise and sunset, Nautical twilight (when the sun is 6-12 degrees below the horizon; you can still see the horizon, but sky is dark enough for stars), and Astronomical twilight (when the sun is 12-18 degrees below the horizon; some celestial bodies will be revealed).

Setting the scene

- Make sure you and your camera are prepared for the weather conditions. If it is stormy, you may find yourself (and your expensive equipment) standing in the rain. If it is very cold, your camera battery may not last as long as normal.
- Make sure you have a sturdy tripod for night photography or for any photography involving slower shutter speeds.
- Remember to bring the appropriate filters. A circular polarizing filter (CPL) will make the skies bluer and will make clouds pop. A neutral density (ND) filter will help manage water reflections and glare. It will also allow you to use longer shutter speeds on bright days. A graduated ND filter is ideal when you have a horizon line and what is above it is too light while what is below it is too dark.
- Shoot in RAW.
- In terms of composing your image, follow the rule of thirds. If you are shooting a sky scene with a landscape, and the theme of the image involves the sky, put the horizon line 1/3 from the bottom of the image. For sky photos, look for potential anchor points like a flock of birds or a plane.
- Pay attention to the histogram to make sure your exposure is correct for the scene you are attempting to capture.
- Experiment with angles and perspectives. Try shooting from a lying down position (if the terrain permits and your knees cooperate).
- Look for unusual phenomena or cloud formations.
- Wide angle lenses (such as 23 mm) work best for landscape images; lenses ranging from 400-800 mm work well when photographing the moon.

Photographing the Night Sky

- If you are interested in shooting the moon, the crescent moon is considered the easiest to capture.
- As previously mentioned, dusk is the best time to photograph a full moon.
- Best settings for photographing the moon: Aperture f/11 to f/16, Shutter Speed 1/100 (adjust between 1/60-1/125), ISO 100, manual focus.
- For White Balance when photographing the moon, consider using the Tungsten setting. Or you can leave it in auto mode and make adjustments in post-processing.
- Use the auto noise reduction option in the camera sparingly, because this drains the battery.
- If you are photographing the stars, shoot in manual mode with the widest aperture. Shutter speed recommendations vary, but should be at least 10 seconds (more likely 20-30 seconds).
- The longer your shutter speed, the more light patterns you will capture. A shutter speed of 15-30 seconds should allow you to capture crisp stars.
- To capture star trails, you may need a substantially longer shutter speed, so make sure you have extra batteries on hand.
- ISO recommendations for photographing the stars also vary (800-3200). Remember, the higher the ISO, the more noise/grain you will find in your image. You can manage the noise in post-processing.
- Setting your WB to Daylight will permit you to capture the stars true to color.
- You can use an LED headlamp or light to illuminate the scene or to do light painting.

Photographing the Daytime Sky

- If the sky is bright, remember to use the appropriate filter.
- To prevent overexposure, you can also lower your exposure compensation.
- Use a wide angle lens.
- A bright sky with puffy clouds reflected in a pool of water is compelling.
- If you are photographing subjects in addition to the sky, keep the sun at a 90-180 degree angle away from the camera so your subjects will be properly exposed.
- You may also consider slightly underexposing your subjects to maintain detail in the sky. This can then be adjusted in post-processing.
- Consider bracketing (automatic exposure bracketing or manual bracketing) and combining the images in post-processing.
- If you want to capture moving clouds, set your shutter speed to 10 seconds; make sure to use a tripod. You should use the lowest ISO possible and a small aperture (f/8-f/11 or even f/18-f/22). You should use an ND filter so the sky won't be blown out.
- Crepuscular rays are rays of sunlight that shine through gaps of clouds. They are best seen close to sunset. To capture them, spot meter for one of the rays and then capture the image using an aperture of about f/8.
- If you are capturing a storm, wait and watch. Set your shutter speed for 5-20 seconds to capture the movement and energy of the storm.
- If you are capturing the sunset/sunrise, and the scene is static, you can set your camera to Aperture Mode. Your ISO should be low. If you set your aperture to f/11-f/16, the camera will choose the appropriate shutter speed. Make sure you use a tripod. If your scene has movement (clouds, trees, water), you should try shooting manually with a shutter speed no faster than 1/4 second. If you have moving clouds, a shutter speed of 1-2 seconds might work well.
- If you are capturing the sunset or sunrise, "Daylight" is typically used for the WB setting. If you want the colors orangey with some blues, set the WB to Auto, Cloudy, or Shade. If you want the orange sky to appear purple, try setting the WB to Fluorescent. If you want deeper colors, try setting the WB to Tungsten.


