



Member Snapshot

Member Snapshot - Todd Mathieson

Todd was born in Springfield, MA and was raised in Worcester. His mother was a social worker and his father worked in sales and also worked for the state. He has a brother, sister, and niece in the Worcester area. Todd's law office is also in Worcester.

As a kid, Todd used the family Kodak Instamatic to take pictures of family events and functions. As a young man, his mother supported his photography by encouraging him to join a camera club. Although he didn't join one until much later, he did own two or three serious film cameras over the years. He never took any photography courses and never did any of his own dark room work.

In 2000 Todd met Maureen at a party given by his best friends, one of whom happened to be a colleague of Maureen's. One of their common interests was photography. Maureen introduced Todd to the DSLR camera, and lent him hers for a trip he took to San Diego. Todd then bought his first DSLR when he went on a camera club outing to a huge trade show in Boston put on by Hunt's Photo and Video.

Todd joined AVCC in 2001. He and Maureen now go on a lot of trips together both for the sheer pleasure of traveling as well as pursuing new images to share with family, friends and fellow competitors. Some of the places they have traveled to were trips with other camera club members: Nova Scotia (twice); the Montreal Balloon Fest (2009); Florida (2010); Washington State.; whale watches; and the Roger Williams and Southwick zoos. They also shoot in National Parks, wildlife refuges, and art museums.

In 2014 Todd and Maureen were awarded the honor of Master Member of New England Camera Club for their 15-year dedication to setting up and working "Photo-Ops" at NECCC and at AVCC. It is not just a physical set-up, but also includes Todd and Maureen helping photographers learn to shoot black light, still life, and water drops. People's images from the water-drop set-up have been presented in AVCC competitions from time to time.

Todd describes himself as a "casual, spontaneous" photographer. He is not one to plan a day of shooting. His other hobbies are golf, cooking new things, and reading. His mild competitive streak comes out in golf, where he'll make a few low-stakes wagers; participating in chili cook-offs; and camera club and other photography competitions. Todd's "Whitmore Falls" image won third place in a PSA International Salon.

Todd has participated in local art exhibits such as at the bank in Hudson, the Marlborough Public Library, the Stow Airport, and Café 641. He has had multiple compliments paid to his work: he sold an image of Worcester's Union Station with the moon behind it to the Northborough Frame Shop, where he had taken it to be printed; when he got a B&W photo of Yosemite Valley printed in two different exposures, the shop asked if they could print one for themselves, and hung it in the shop; and he traded his photos of the Kerry Boys, an Irish band, for them to use on their album cover in exchange for a free copy of the album.



From Jonathan Bush

Back on Friday, May 10th, shortly before getting ready to go to bed, my wife said "isn't tonight one of the nights when the Northern Lights are supposed to be most visible?" I realized that it was indeed (not knowing

how *I* had lost track of this timely information) and decided to step out the front door and check the skies to see, not with my eyes but with the help of my iPhone, some beautiful and unusual colors, mostly pink and magenta, appearing in the sky between the openings of the trees surrounding our house. I could immediately feel the tingling of goosebumps. At that moment I knew that going to bed was no longer an immediate priority. I grabbed my camera backpack and tripod, got into my car, and for the next 3 hours drove around Berlin, Boylston, and Clinton in search of some interesting foregrounds with a good northerly exposure. Although I got a few images I liked, I felt that this one was the best, titled "No Trespassing."

I still find it amazing what current cameras can "see" at 12:30 a.m. on a moon-less night!

What was also interesting about this night was how communal it felt. There were a lot more people than I expected wandering around in the dark, as I was, with cameras and smart phones in search of a good location to capture this event that is so rare in this area. However, it sounds like we *may* get another chance in June! June Solar Storms?

From Lynn Kerner

My Aurora Borealis-chase:

On May 10th the Northern Lights were visible here, a rare occurrence. I wanted to go out and shoot, figuring it was perhaps a once-in-a-lifetime experience to have them right here. I knew that fellow members Rick and Jim were going to go to a trail near a pond in Berlin after midnight, when the clouds were supposed to clear out. I had been sick, and wasn't sure I was going to get myself together to go out that late. I told them I'd let them know if I was going, but I fell asleep. Tips and Tricks - June's Theme: Setting Photography Goals

Tips for Setting Photography Goals

Setting Photography Goals

As this 2023-2024 Assabet Valley Camera Club year draws to a close, we celebrate a year of compelling photography, shared experiences, and meaningful moments along the flourishing path of our artistic journey. We have learned from a variety of interesting programs and from each other. We have learned from the critiques of our esteemed judges. If we were to take those "First day of school" and "Last day of school" photos that families often do for their children in September and June, we might not see that we are taller or more 'grown up' - in fact, some of us may be half an inch shorter. We might not see any changes, but we have changed. We have expanded our minds and developed new skills, leaving us with much to celebrate. June is a wonderful time of the year to revisit our accomplishments as we wind down to bask in the rejuvenating summer sun. It's also a great time to plan for the upcoming 2024-2025 Camera Club season and set goals for continued growth and advancement.

Brainstorming

So, what have you accomplished over the past year in photography? What went well for you? What would you have liked to have done better? What are potential areas of growth for you in the upcoming year? Do you have any priorities - what do you think you might want to work on first? Take the time to think, and write things down; ideas tend to take on a life of their own when you write them down.

Set goals that are **SMART**: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, and Time-bound.

Specific: What exactly do you hope to accomplish? Do you want to achieve higher scores on competition night, for example? Do you want to learn a new skill? Macro, perhaps? Do you want to take better Nature photographs? Do you want to get away from relying on Auto Mode? Do you want to do something with your photographs? Maybe start a business selling them, make greeting cards from them, or turn them into gifts? Whatever your goal may be, write it down. Take the time to do some research and think about what you might need to do to accomplish your goals. Document all the steps you will need to take on your path to success.

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Measurable: Make sure that you have a measurable outcome. You might say that you want to take better Nature Photographs, but how will you measure that? Maybe you averaged 8.0 on competition night for your Nature photographs. Maybe your goal might be to have an average score of 8.3 next year. If you want to start a business with your photography, maybe you could set a goal to have a website up and running by 1/1/25 or that you will find one gift shop to sell some of your photo cards by 12/1/24. When you plan your goals, make them a little challenging, and don't be afraid to step outside of your zone of comfort.

Attainable: Are your goals realistic? No matter how talented you are, it's not likely that you will score a 10 with every Nature photograph, but you might well be able to bump your average score from 8.0 to 8.3 with careful planning and improvement of your technique. You might not be able to have a showing of your images at the MFA in Boston, but you may be well able to have them displayed at your local library.

Relevant: Look at the big picture. Are your goals relevant? Do they move you in the direction of your overall ambition? If you really want to be a better Nature photographer or start a business, your goals should be a blueprint to help you move towards those goals.

Achievable: Can your goals be accomplished? If you are trying without success, maybe you need to reassess your goals and re-examine your strategy to achieve them. Remember: Setbacks are not failures. Setbacks tell us that our plans may not be effective. We learn and grow from our setbacks. We are fortunate enough to be in the shared company of many talented photographers. Do any fellow members have similar goals to yours? Maybe you can work together to help each other and/or share strategies. Are any of our fellow members experts at what you are trying to achieve? Try reaching out to them for assistance. Another important point to remember is that if you are trying something new, it takes about a month for it to become habitual. If your goal is to shoot a certain number of photos every day, you may have to push yourself at the beginning, but after about a month, it will become part of your daily routine.

Time-bound: Putting a time-frame on your goals will help you form benchmarks to assess your progress. If you want to have a website up and running by 1/1/25, you can't sit down to do it on 12/31/24. You need to set dates to accomplish the various steps of the process so you are ready for the big day. If you want to take better Nature photographs, you probably don't want to be out by a frozen pond in February, camera in hand, hoping that the ducks will do something interesting for the Nature submission that is due by midnight (as this writer has done in the past). A better goal might be to have 4-5 competition-worthy Nature shots by the first meeting in September, which will give you the entire summer to look for compelling Nature shots without worrying about camera shake from your shivering hands.

Now that we are all thinking about ways to grow through the summer, here are a few ideas. Whatever you decide to do, we hope you enjoy your summer, and we can't wait to see you all back again in September. And in the words of our own Bob Cooke, "Keep clicking!"

You might consider investing in a book, doing some internet research, or perusing the photography resources at your local library or book shop. - Do you want to improve your Nature Photography? Now is the time to visit Bruce's Pond and the local wildlife refuges. Opportunities await you. There is always safety in numbers, so consider inviting a friend.


